THE NICENE CREED

WE believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. HOLY and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

Bicentennial Adult Forum: On Sunday, December 16, at 10:00 a.m., in Keith Hall, the Reverend Dr. Robert Prichard, Arthur Lee Kinsolving Professor of Christianity in America at Virginia Theological Seminary, will make a presentation on the history of the Episcopal Church, 1918-2018.

A Service of Lessons and Carols for Christmas: The annual Service of Lessons and Carols for Christmas, sung by the Choir of Christ Church, will take place on Sunday, December 16, at 5:00 p.m. Modeled after the famed service held each year at King's College, Cambridge, this festive, candlelit liturgy will include works by Bob Chilcott, Morten Lauridsen, William Mathias, Boris Ord, Sergei Rachmaninoff, Stanford Scriven, and David Willcocks. Arrive early to ensure seating. A reception will follow. Please note that the 5:00 p.m. Sunday Eucharist will begin at 6:00 p.m. so that parishioners who wish to do so are able to attend both services.

Christmas Pageant: Christ Church's second annual Christmas Pageant will take place on Friday, December 21, at 6:30 p.m., in the Church. It will be followed by a festive, family-friendly reception in Keith Hall. This year's pageant, designed to be a low-stress, faith-forming experience for people of all ages, is drawn almost entirely from the Gospels of Luke and Matthew.
